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1 Your Reference Committee appreciates the robust testimony received on Late Resolution 1. All 2 testimony supported the intent and spirit of the resolution, with some suggestions for changes in 3 wording or additions. There were concerns from multiple groups and individuals about the wording 4 of the first resolve, including concerns about the lack of data provided in the whereas clauses 5 about the public health implications of deportation. Multiple amendments were suggested, 6 including from the RFS representative to the MAS Governing Council, and your Reference 7 Committee attempted to incorporate these while addressing the concerns and capturing the 8 original intent of the authors. 9

10 Several individuals raised concerns with the wording of the second resolve and noted that it was 11 largely already part of current AMA policy. The authors indicated they did not feel strongly about 12 its inclusion, and thus your Reference Committee chose to strike it. For the third resolve, your 13 Section Delegates as well as multiple individuals expressed concern about the wording, including 14 aualifying who should and should not be protected from deportation. Your Reference Committee 15 agreed and broadened this language. Further, the intent of the original fourth resolve is now 16 integrated in the amended first resolve and therefore the original is stricken to be more concise. 17 Finally, your Section Delegates, along with the RFS Standing Committees on Legislation and 18 Advocacy and Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion spoke against the immediate forwarding 19 clause, noting that while this issue is timely the AMA already has policy on many related topics, 20 and that there was not sufficient justification provided as to why this needed to be immediately forwarded at this meeting. Your Reference Committee agrees and recommends that Late 21
